2008-2009 Season Preview

Last season, the Misericordia men's basketball team finished 19-10 and reached the Pennsylvania Athletic Conference and the Eastern College Athletic Conference semi-finals.

This year, the team debuts in the Freedom Conference, a move that head coach **Trevor Woodruff** expects to be nearly seamless. "They're not new teams to us," Woodruff said. "We're familiar with most of the teams and expect every game to be demanding and challenging. We're looking forward to building local rivalries." Woodruff was named PAC Coach of the Year last season after leading his team to its first winning record in five years.

The team lost key contributors to graduation, but Woodruff sees his Cougars contending in the Freedom from the start. "Everyone's working hard, and we're focused," Woodruff said. "We have strong chemistry because our guys enjoy playing together. We've built a culture of defense in the last few seasons."

Senior **Vinny Baumunk** and juniors **Dom Del Prete** and **Marcus Little** were named captains after strong showings last season.

Baumunk, a 6-6 center, led last season's squad in scoring. He averaged 15.0 points per game and was named an All-PAC first teamer and Cougar MVP. On defense, he set a new school record for career blocked shots with 86 and averaged 6.2 rebounds per game. "Vinny has had one of the best careers at Misericordia leading up to now, so he's our main weapon," Woodruff said.

Del Prete, a 6-3 forward, averaged 11.0 points per game and led the team with 105 free throws made for a .795 percentage. Defensively, he averaged 5.2 rebounds and 1.7 steals per game.

Little, a 5-9 point guard, averaged 6.4 points, 2.8 assists and 1.0 steals per game.

"Collectively, there's a lot of experience there with the three of them," Woodruff said. "Vinny and Dom are really vocal leaders, and Marcus leads more by example."

With three starters returning, the team is working to develop its young players and fill gaps, but seniors **Marqus Hunter** and **Andy Smith** will look to play key roles. "They've put their time in as three-year letter winners, and we expect them to contribute," Woodruff said.

After seeing extensive playing time off the bench as a freshman, guard **Robbie Johnson** will assume a role as a starter. He appeared in all 28 games last season, contributing 5.6 points per game.

Other returnees include sophomore guards **Frank Nutt** and **Mark Leonard**. Both appeared in seven games last season. Junior forward **Mark Williams** enters the season injured but could see time in the second semester.

Nine freshmen—exactly half the team—fill out the roster. Woodruff says that he will be carefully watching their development as time goes on. The freshman class includes:

forward **Matt Braithwaite** and guards **Ethan Eichhorst**, **Michael Gaudio**, **Dusty Roberts**, **Zach Sensenig**, **Jeff Slanovec**, **Chris Undersinger**, **Tyler White** and **Jonathon Zaremba**.

"We're hoping the young guys can step in and give us depth," Woodruff said. "It's a really balanced league. There are no weak teams, and there's not much that separates the top teams from the bottom teams. I expect us to be competitive."

For the first time since 1991, the Cougars won't open the season with at Laurel Line Tournament. While MU will host the 17th Annual Laurel Line, they will open the season against Susquehanna at the White Rose City Classic at York College, November 15. Misericordia will face Baptist Bible in the opening round of the Laurel Line a week later.

MISERICORDIA BELONGS TO NCAA, MAC, ECAC

Misericordia University belongs to the NCAA Division III, Freedom Conference/Middle Atlantic States Athletics Corporation (MAC) and the Eastern College Athletic Conference.

After competing in the MAC in swimming and track & field in 2007-08, MU is beginning its first full season in the Freedom Conference and MAC after 16 years as a member of the Pennsylvania Athletic Conference. Misericordia began ECAC and NCAA competition in 1992.

The MAC sponsors competition in 11 men's sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, lacrosse, soccer, swimming, tennis and outdoor track & field; and 11 women's sports: basketball, cross country, field hockey, indoor track & field, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming tennis, outdoor track & field and volleyball.

With approximately 430 members and 150,000 student-athletes competing annually, Division III is the largest of the NCAA's three divisions.

Division III institutions place high priority on the overall quality of the educational experience and the successful completion of all students' academic programs.

Formed in 1938, the ECAC is the nation's largest athletic conference with more than 300 members in Divisions I, II and III from Maine to North Carolina.

ATHLETICS FACILITIES

The athletic facilities at Misericordia University are highlighted by the **Anderson Sports-Health Center** and the **Anderson Outdoor Athletic Complex**.

Since 1993, the **Anderson Center** has provided a home for the Cougars basketball, volleyball and swim teams.

The building houses the athletic department offices, campus health center and nursing, physical therapy and occupational therapy classrooms and laboratories.

The center features a six-lane swimming pool, indoor track, racquetball courts, fitness center and an aerobic/dance studio. The **Anderson Sports-Health Center** attracts more than 75,000 visitors annually for recreational use.

Mangelsdorf Field at the **Anderson Athletic Complex** was constructed in 2002 and serves as a home for the soccer, field hockey, lacrosse and track & field programs.

The complex features a synthetic grass field and a six-lane synthetic track which allow MU's student-athletes to remain active even when weather conditions are less than ideal.

Named for the late **Dr. Robert S. and Geraldine Ruth Daley Anderson**, the **Anderson Sports-Health Center**, **Anderson Athletic Complex** and **Anderson Fields** are tributes to their commitment to Misericordia University.

Mangelsdorf Field honors the dedication of **Jack and Dorothy Mangelsdorf** to MU and the region.

The Misericordia tennis complex was built in 2004 as part of a gift by the M&T Foundation.

MISERICORDIA UNIVERSITY IN BRIEF

Misericordia University is a liberal arts based, co-educational Catholic institution serving both residential and commuting students.

Founded in 1924, Misericordia is the oldest four-year institution in Luzerne County and made the transition to University status in 2007.

Sponsored by the Religious Sisters of Mercy, MU is one of 18 Mercy institutions in the United States.

Misericordia welcomes individuals from all faiths and offers a variety of liberal arts and professional programs at the undergraduate and graduate levels.

MU offers 30 majors in three academic colleges: Arts and Sciences; Health Sciences; and Professional Studies and Social Sciences.

The University is dedicated to the values of the Sisters of Mercy: mercy, service, justice and hospitality. These values can be found throughout the University, from programs of study to service projects.

The hallmark of MU is a dedicated faculty and a high quality core liberal arts and sciences curriculum.

In addition to their diploma, MU students can participate in the school's Guaranteed Placement Program. The GPP is a promise that, within six months of graduation, students will have a position in the career of their choice or be enrolled in graduate school, or the University will provide a paid internship in the student's field of study.

With a total enrollment of 2,355 students, Misericordia offers the benefits of a small university with the scope of a larger institution.

Classroom size is purposefully small to ensure personalized attention and our 12:1 student/faculty ratio allows students and faculty to truly know one another. Approximately 82% of MU's 94 full-time faculty hold a Ph.D. or other terminal degree.

In addition to academic pursuits, MU students participate in a wide range of athletic, recreational, spiritual, social and cultural activities with more than two dozen clubs organizations on campus.

MU sponsors 20 varsity sports including men's soccer, cross country, basketball, swimming, golf, lacrosse, track & field, baseball and tennis; and women's soccer, volleyball, field hockey, cross-country, tennis, basketball, swimming, softball, lacrosse, track & field and cheerleading.

After 16 seasons of competition in the Pennsylvania Athletic Conference, the Cougars will make the move to the Freedom Conference and Middle Atlantic States Collegiate Athletics Corporation.

Misericordia won 29 total PAC championships and made the playoffs in field hockey, volleyball, men's and women's soccer, women's tennis, men's and women's basketball, women's lacrosse, baseball and softball in 2007-08.

Located in Dallas, PA, MU's 123-acre campus has a suburban atmosphere and is only nine miles from Wilkes-Barre and two hours from New York City and Philadelphia.



**DAVE MARTIN
Athletic Director**

Dave Martin is in his fifth year as director of athletics at Misericordia University.

In his first four years, the Cougars won seven Pennsylvania Athletic Conference championships and earned five NCAA tournament berths.

In addition, he guided the Cougars through the transition from the Pennsylvania Athletic Conference to the Freedom Conference and Middle Atlantic States Athletics Corporation (MAC).

He has also overseen the addition of men's tennis as a varsity sport offering at MU.

Martin previously spent 14 seasons as head men's basketball coach at Misericordia and served as associate athletic director and coordinator of athletic recruiting.

He led the Cougars to 11 Pennsylvania Athletic Conference playoff berths and two PAC finals appearances.

Martin compiled 178 career wins at MU and was a four-time PAC Coach of the Year.

A graduate of Wilkes University, Martin earned a master's degree in education from Misericordia.

Head Coach**

Trevor Woodruff, '99 is in his fifth season as head men's basketball coach at Misericordia University.

A year ago, he was the Pennsylvania Athletic Conference Coach of the Year after leading the Cougars to a 19-10 record and playoff berths in the PAC and ECAC.

During his playing days at MU, Woodruff served as team captain as a senior and was a PAC All-Academic selection. He was an All-Pennsylvania Athletic Conference selection and led the Cougars to the 1999 PAC title game.

Previously, he spent four years as a teacher and coach at Delaware Valley High School and led the Warriors to their first-ever Lackawanna League championship.

Woodruff made the transition to Lackawanna College where he was named the NJCAA District and Regional coach of the year after leading the Falcons to a 27-7 record and a trip to the national tournament.

He has overseen the development of 10 all-conference performers, three all-region selections and an All-American.

In addition, with an emphasis on academic success, he has coached 11 All-Academic honorees.

Woodruff is assisted by **Corey Brown** (Misericordia, '06), **Jerry Blazick** (Wilkes, '02) and **Mike Slavoski**.
